Course Overview

Aim

The aim of this course is to give health care practitioners better understanding of the legal complexities that underpin clinical decisions and equip them with the basic knowledge of health law necessary to make sound clinical and management decisions consistent with good medical practice.

The Law Intensive 1 serves as a supplement and pre-requisite to the ACLM Law Intensive 2 (formerly Advanced Law Intensive).

Learning Outcomes

1. Identify the legal framework that underpins the health care system in Australia.
2. Differentiate between the consent required for treatment (trespass) and informed consent (negligence).
3. Explain the legal medicine issues surrounding assisted reproductive technology and the doctrine of double effect in clinical practice.
4. Apply the principles of confidentiality and privacy to your clinical practice and record keeping system.
5. Recognise the legal issues and differences of voluntary assisted dying legislation in the Australian states.
6. Demonstrate an understanding of coronial law and how it is applied to investigate reportable deaths.

About the Course

The Law Intensive 1 begins with an introduction to the legal framework that supports the health system. Consent to medical treatment, clinical negligence, confidentiality and privacy are then discussed. The program also examines the issues in clinical practice that relate to the beginning and end of life. Specifically, the topics discussed are artificial reproductive technology (ART), the doctrine of double effect and voluntary assisted dying legislation. The day concludes with an overview of coronial law and how it is applied to investigate reportable deaths. Each presentation is followed by small group discussion of clinical case studies that relate to the subject material. The small groups each then report back to the whole group, identifying the legal issues that were involved in the clinical situation presented.

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Teaching Faculty



Dr Don Buchanan – Forensic Physician & Legal Practitioner

Don Buchanan has been a full time forensic medical officer in Queensland for over 30 years, during which time he was director of state government medical officer services for 7 years. He obtained his medical degree at the University of Queensland and is a Fellow of the Australian College of General Practitioners and a Fellow of the Australasian College of Biomedical Scientists. Don is a past President of the Australasian College of Legal Medicine, and is an Honorary Life Fellow, Council Member and current Honorary Treasurer. He obtained a Master of Public Health from the University of Queensland in 1996 and was awarded a Juris Doctor (a graduate law degree) from the University of Queensland in 2003 and admitted as a legal practitioner in the Supreme Court of Queensland in 2004. He is registered as a barrister through the Bar Association of Queensland and has completed a Master of Laws (Health Law) from the Queensland University of Technology. He has worked as the deputy coronial registrar and is currently an acting magistrate (coroner) at the Coroners Court of Queensland.



Prof John Devereux – Professor of Law, University of Queensland

John Devereux teaches and researches the law of torts at the UQ Law School. He has a special interest in medical law, most notably in the areas of competency to consent to medical treatment and in epilepsy and the law. A Rhodes Scholar, John has worked as a lawyer in a variety of contexts including as a Barrister, as a consultant to a multi-national law firm, a Law Reform Commissioner for Queensland, a legal member of the Social Security Appeals Tribunal and as a Defence Force Magistrate. John was formerly Lecturer in Law at Keble College, Oxford University and Assistant Dean of Magdalen College, Oxford University. He is a former Associate Vice Chancellor of A.C.U. John is an Honorary Fellow of the Australasian College of Legal Medicine and joint Head of Teaching Faculty.



Prof Roy Beran – Neurologist & Professor

Roy G. Beran is a consultant neurologist and accredited sleep physician. His qualifications include: MBBS, MD, FRACP, FRACGP, Grad. Dip. Tertiary Ed., Grad. Dip. Further Ed., FAFPHM, FACLM, FRCP(Edin), FAAN, FANZAN, FACBS, B Leg. S, MHL and FFFLM (Hon). He is a Conjoint Professor of Medicine at the University of NSW; Professor in the School of Medicine at Griffith University, Queensland; Conjoint Professor, Medical School, Western Sydney University; and Professor, Chair, Sechenov Moscow 1st State University, Moscow, Russia. Following Russia's invasion of Ukraine, he refused to re-sign with Sechenov University. He is: a founding Fellow of the Australasian College of Legal Medicine (ACLM); Past President thereof, stepped down in 2011, still on Council and awarded Honorary Life Fellowship. In 2019, he was appointed 'Joint Head of Teaching Faculty'. He is the Australian Governor and was elected as President of the World Association for Medical Law (WAML), in 2022, a position he still holds, having previously been Secretary General, Executive Vice President and Regional Vice President. He was the first Honorary Fellow of the Faculty of Forensic & Legal Medicine of the Royal College of Physicians (London). He has published: almost 400 papers, book chapters and letters to the editor; presented in excess of 430 papers at national and international meetings; written or edited 17 books; serves on numerous editorial boards; and is the editor in chief of the international journal, *Medicine and Law*, the official journal of the WAML.



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Teaching Faculty



Professor Kurosh Parsi – Dermatologist, Phlebologist and Vascular Anomalies Specialist

Professor Kurosh Parsi, MBBS, MSc (Med), PhD, LL.M, FACD, FACP, FACLM is a dermatologist, phlebologist and vascular anomalies specialist. Prof. Parsi is the Head of Department of Dermatology, St. Vincent's Hospital, Sydney, Australia and Program Head, Dermatology, Phlebology and Fluid Mechanics Research Laboratory, St. Vincent's Centre for Applied Medical Research. Professor Parsi sub-specializes in vascular anomalies and vascular dermatology.

Prof. Parsi is a conjoint Professor of Medicine at University of New South Wales (UNSW) and served as an Adjunct Professor of Fluid Mechanics at the University of Sydney, School of Mechanical and Mechatronic Engineering. He is a medical graduate of the University of Sydney, obtained his Master of Science in Medicine followed by a PhD in thrombosis, haemostasis and fibrinolysis from the UNSW and a Master of International Law (LLM) from the University of Salford (Manchester, UK). Dr Prasi is currently completing a juris doctor degree with the University of Canberra.

Prof. Parsi served as President of the International Union of Phlebology (UIP) (2019-2023) and prior to that served as Vice President (2009-2013), Treasurer (2013-2017) and President-elect (2018-2019). Professor Parsi served the Australasian College of Phlebology (ACP) as President (2007-2017) and was the convener of the ACP annual Scientific Meetings (2007-2017) and the World Congress of Phlebology (Melbourne, Australia; 4-8 February 2018).
